Mayor's Message

It is recreation time! Spring is here and boys and girls thoughts turn to basketball, baseball, soccer, football, swimming, hiking, climbing, just about anything to get out of the house where they have been all winter. We have a great recreation program, and every year the number of youth involved in organized recreation grows. Not too long ago, Mapleton youth would go to Springville to join the Springville recreation leagues, now we have Springville residents coming to Mapleton's leagues. Some of us remember the great work of a former council member, Wave Miguel, as he brought baseball to Mapleton. The growth of the baseball program was a motivating force in the acquisition of Ira Allen Park, the building of four baseball diamonds and many soccer fields. Mapleton now has a Recreation Director with supporting staff to handle the growth of demand on our programs. It has not slowed down. Last year we had about 900 boys and girls sign up for T-ball, coach pitch, baseball, softball and the V.I.P baseball league. We had about 800 youth sign up for soccer teams, and 450 youth sign up for basketball. The indications are that there will be even more this year.

But the city's recreation programs are not limited to the youth. In addition to baseball, softball, basketball and soccer, the recreation department offers the following programs for all ages:

- Family walking program
- Tennis
- Self Defense
- Volleyball
- Dance instruction,
- Tai Chi and others

Impact fees, paid by the developers of new subdivisions will be used to make improvements to Ira Allen Park. In the next month, work will begin on a new concession stand between the backstops with plans for future electronic scoreboards. Those of you who have been sitting in the bleachers only to be hit or startled by

foul balls will be happy to know that safety netting will be installed above the bleachers. A batting cage will be built, and we are looking at options to increase parking spaces.

Not all of our recreational activities need to be organized by the city. Some prefer the solitude of walking, jogging, horseback riding, biking, hiking, or just being outdoors. We have and will continue to make improvements to Eagle Rock Park and trail. In the next few years we should have a long north-south trail along the Mapleton-Springville irrigation canal, and we are currently looking into acquiring additional land for future city parks and trails as well as exploring the costs of building a multi-purpose recreational center.

Mapleton will continue to be a beautiful place to live and raise our families. We want our recreational plans to keep pace with our growth. 2007 Open Burn Season

April 14th-May 13th, 2007

The 2007 Utah County open burn season will start on Saturday April 14 and will run thru Sunday May 13. Mapleton residents that are interested in burning yard waste will be required to have a burn permit. Burn permits will be available at the Mapleton City Office and will only be issued if the Utah County air quality Clearing Index will allow for open burning. The permit will only be valid for the date issued. Burn permits will be issued for Saturday and Sunday if the Utah County air quality Clearing Index allows for open burning on the Friday prior to that weekend. Residents may contact the Mapleton City Office at 489-5655 to inquire on the availability of burn permits on the day they intend to burn. Please follow ALL guidelines listed on the Burn Permit. Public Works

Pressurized Irrigation will be turned on April 16th. For all outside water use, please be mindful of water conservation by checking your sprinkling systems for proper coverage. Check the soil with some type of probe to see at what depth water is penetrating the soil. Clay soils may require an application of water with two separate intervals to provide better penetration of water.

Please check the coverage of your sprinkling systems. Adjust the heads so that water is not spraying onto the sidewalk or into the street. To further optimize your sprinkling system for better service, more stations may need to be added to provide better coverage of the landscaped area. Connection to a secondary water source requires a physical air gap, not just a valve between the secondary and culinary systems. As part of our cross connection program and for public awareness, we do periodic checks on the systems.

Please also be aware that a cross connection between the pressurized irrigation system and the culinary water system is in violation of State and Municipal Code (Mapleton City Section 13.30, Class B misdemeanor). This is to protect against cross contamination to the City's culinary water system.

Shade Tree Committee

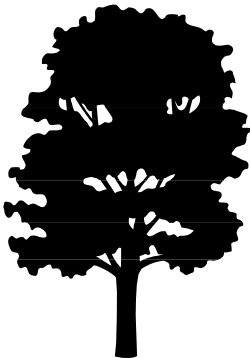

Lets Plant a Tree - Ash Fraxinus Anomala

Single leaf, height 20', and width 10'. Ash trees do well in Mapleton. There was a concerted effort to plant white ash in about 1912. The white ash trees lining the west side of the discarded City Building were among the plantings. Many others are still standing. The most recommended variety for planting today is the seedless Marshal Ash. Other species are the European, Modesto, Green Ash and Single Leaf Ash. They grow well in moisture scarce thin soils.

The Charles Leonard Whiting Home

250 North 300 West
Mapleton, Utah

Charles Leonard Whiting was born January 26, 1886 in Mapleton and was the eighth in a family of sixteen children. He married Olive Rachel Carleton on January 25, 1911 in the Salt Lake Temple. The cost of this new home was reported as being \$500.00, the money being borrowed. The original floor plan consisted of five rooms – no clothes closets and no bathroom. In short, no conveniences of any kind except a stairway leading down into a cellar used for food storage. Water was pumped from an outdoor well. However, there was a built-in cupboard for dishes and kettles, flour and sugar bins.

The two front rooms were to be used as dining room and parlor, but the parlor became a third bedroom with the two double beds, the double door opening being covered with heavy drapes for some privacy. This double doorway proved to be ideal for musical and dramatic theatrical presentations by the children to a father who delighted in being so entertained. In those days of no radio, no television, a hand-wound graphophone was used for music. A foot-treadle organ was a help at times too. Two black coal stoves were used, one being a cook stove, the other a pot-bellied heater in the dining room area.

Later, after city water was available, a kitchen sink was put on the north kitchen wall. Many years later, when Charles and Olive moved home after more than five years living in Island Park, Idaho, the middle bedroom was remodeled into a bathroom and clothes closets. Another owner of the home, Susan Oliver, had her father there to improve and update the house. Reshingling the roof, changing the front door, making new kitchen cupboards, installing modern laundry facilities, opening up a hallway and closing off areas for clothes closets have been done. Other plans are also in mind to improve the house.

Charles was famous for his fruits and productive vegetable garden. He served on the City Council when City water lines were installed in Mapleton, about 1929. Also, he was Water Master for Mapleton Irrigation Company for several years. Just north of the Whiting home was Charles Whiting's Blacksmith Shop, operated from 1912 until about 1936 when Charles' health failed him for several years. He shod horses, beat plow shears, manufactured many tools and repaired all farm equipment. His shop became quite a social gathering place for farmers in Mapleton. Later, his brother-in-law, Renton Richards who was a mechanic, joined Charles in a Whiting and Richards Garage. The addition was built onto the north side of the Blacksmith Shop. Automobiles were now into use in Mapleton. Many more customers now came at noon for Olive to cook for, which she had always done; but now owners of automobiles joined the large family. The noon meal was indeed a social gathering. In this small kitchen there was always room for anyone and everyone.

The land Charles had his home and businesses on was originally a five-acre piece. He and Olive purchased it from Lelia Whiting on April 7, 1914 for \$650.00. However, this transaction was not recorded until February 19, 1917. As of November 1, 1989, all ten of Charles and Olive's children were still living. They are Leonard, Helen, Beryl, Wilma, Harley, June Beulah, Jesse, Carma and Ardith.
