Mayor's Message

Opening of the New Community Center, January 23rd

The City Council and Mayor are pleased to announce the official opening date for our City's New Community Center. We would like to invite all the Mapleton residents to attend this event to be held on January 23, 2006 starting at 3:30 pm. There will be a 30 minute program with singing groups from our 2 elementary schools, the Mapleton Chorale and brief comments from our Lieutenant Governor, Gary Herbert. Following the opening ceremony tours will be conducted through the new building from 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm and there will be light refreshments. At approximately 8:00 pm we will be able to enjoy a dancing display.

We are extremely pleased with the New Community Center; having been built at a very competitive price during a time of abnormal price increases for materials. The work accomplished by the contractors has far exceeded the City's expectations.

City Staff, including Police personnel, moved into the new city building on January 9th. The move was accomplished by our employees without the need to hire any additional help.

Many of our citizens have given generous cash and in kind donations. This response is greatly appreciated. This is your building which includes a new library, and Senior Citizens Center, City Office and Police and we want everyone in the Community to see it and use it.

State of the City Address From the Office of Mayor Allan

Annual City Audit

At our December 7th City Council Meeting the City Auditor, Greg Ogden, reported to the Council on his detailed analysis and review of the City's accounts as part of his comprehensive annual audit.

Special tribute was made regarding the City's healthy financial balances and the Auditor commended the City for its prudent financial management of the City's budget noting in particular that departmental expenditures had been kept within budget forecasts.

Preparing for Growth

The City is under increasing pressure from major land owners for future residential development. Over the past few months approaches have been made for 3 further expansions to the west and south of Mapleton that collectively would generate in excess of a thousand additional homes. This is in addition to the 490 new homes now under phased construction in the Harvest Park Development. It is inescapably clear that there are only 2 options for Mapleton City, it will either grow well or grow badly, but either way the growth will take place and Mapleton's population could inevitably double over the next 5-10 years.

State of the City Address From the Office of Mayor Allan Continued

In order to plan properly to insure Mapleton retains its unique identity, the City is planning ahead so that we will have the necessary roads, water, sewer and power infrastructure in order to be ready for this growth according to a structured balanced program that complies with the City's Master Plan. It is against this anticipated future growth that the City took the bold initiative to build our New Community Center of such a size that it will adequately serve the communities needs in the future.

The City now has 5.5 million gallons of water storage capacity to take care of our growth over the next few years. However, the City Council is looking at the possibility of a new culinary well on 1600 West in the vicinity of the Slant Road in order to take care of future growth west of highway 89, in addition to the Harvest Park Development. The City is also considering an additional culinary well and water storage tank on the Southeast bench area to accommodate the planned future growth in that area.

The services of Aqua Engineering have been retained to undertake a feasibility study relating to a proposal for the City to construct a self contained sewer treatment plant in Mapleton. Although in the preliminary planning stages, it is anticipating that this \$8 million dollar cost could be financed with impact fees to be contributed by 3 potential large scale developers. The City Council would relinquish its 23% equity with the Spanish Fork Treatment Plant that would no longer be needed and this would generate approximately \$2 million dollars as the City's contribution to the proposed new separate sewer treatment plant. By this arrangement, it would be possible for the City to build and finance its own separate waste water treatment plant system without any further cost to the City's resources and would give us full control of our own system.

Pressurized Secondary Water System

Growth of the Secondary Water Pressurized System is currently being planned for implementation. As soon as the Central Utah Project constructs the major pipeline from Diamond Fork to the mouth of Spanish Fork Canyon, the CUP will install a pressurized 48 in. pipeline around the Mapleton Canal. Then the City would be in a position to begin to extend the pressurized system throughout the whole of the City. This project would help greatly to conserve our precious culinary water resources and, equally important, we would achieve significant savings on our monthly water bills.

Public Safety

Our Public Safety Departments continue to function extremely efficiently and are professionally managed providing excellent levels of cost effective services throughout our community. Through the leadership of Stephanie Olsen over the Ambulance Service and Josh Diamond over the Fire Department, under the leadership of Police Chief Dean Pettersson, thousands of tax dollars have been saved without any reduction in services.

The citizens committee charged with the responsibility for advising the City Council on future service provision for Fire and Ambulance coverage is developing proposals for the construction of a new Fire/Ambulance station to replace the existing inadequate facilities. The City anticipates being in a position to begin a new building towards the end of 2006.

Recreation

With the continuing collaboration and excellent cooperation between the City and Nebo School District Representatives, agreements have been secured for the joint community use of the outdoor athletics facilities and indoor gymnasiums at the Hobble Creek Elementary School and as of August 2006, in the new Jr. High School at 1200 North 400 East.

Public Works

Our Public Works Department under the Direction of Scott Bird provides exceptional work in repairing, maintaining streets, water, sewer lines and snow removal.

Volunteer Services

I wish to place on record my profound appreciation for the work of the volunteers in our community and those that serve on our planning commission and various voluntary committees of the City and the Youth Council. Without this help it would be impossible to run this City effectively. Two years ago, the new Community Center building was a dream, and now it is a reality thanks to your donations and I would like to place on record my appreciation for the work done by the contractors, architects and generous contributions from our residents and staff. This new building provides us with a library, police department, justice court, administration office, senior citizen center and recreation center and will be a place for families to hold wedding receptions, reunions, etc. With our generous library donations we now have sufficient funds in place to immediately proceed with the expansion of the new library into the basement area and construction work on this extension is imminent.

Thank you for your support and help to make this such a great Community to live in.

Community Development

Changes

With the New Year comes a new change. The Planning & Zoning Department has officially changed its name, and is now known as the Community Development Department. This change is meant to reflect all of the functions within the department. Rather than call the department what it truly was, the Planning, Zoning and Building Department, it is much easier to refer to it as "Community Development". Other cities have the Building Department separate from Planning and Zoning. Some cities combine them. The term "Community Development" is well known through out the Country when referring to a department that includes all three of the major responsibilities. In our case we changed the name so that people would know that the department is "all encompassing".

Location

The Community Development Department is located on the southeast end of the new Community Center building, located at 125 West Community Center Way (400 West), which is just west of Central Bank. Inside the building, the Community Development Department is directly next to the Library entrance.

Growth

Mapleton City issued a total of 157 building permits in 2005. Of those, 87 were for new home construction. We also issued four building permits for new Commercial structures. Assuming that all of the building permits issued for new home construction resulted in a habitable dwelling by the end of the year, and by applying what the last census figures suggested were the average persons per household in Mapleton (4.02 persons per household), that would translate to a population increase of 350 persons. Using end of the year figures from 2004, we can assume that Mapleton's population is roughly 7,180.

Special Thanks

We would like to thank Ron Wittusen for his years of service on the Planning Commission. Ron's term expired at the year end. His insight and expertise, especially in the construction trade, will be missed. Ron has been replaced by former Planning Commission member Barbra Pratt.

Planning Commission Training

We have invited Neil Lindberg, Esq., AICP, of Lindberg & Associates, to provide the Mapleton City Planning Commission with training. Mr. Lindberg, who is both a professional attorney and planner, is the author of the Mapleton TDR Ordinance. The training will be held on Thursday, January 26, 2006. The training session will begin at 6:30 P.M. in the new City Council chambers, 125 West Community Center Way, Mapleton. The public is welcome to attend but in the interest of time, no questions or comments will be taken from the public.

Police Department

Animal Licensing

As some of you are aware, the Utah County Animal Shelter is no longer in operation. The new Animal Shelter is called the, South Utah Valley Animal Shelter, and is still located at 582 West 3000 North in Spanish Fork, Utah. The phone number to the Shelter is 851-4089.

Along with the changes the fees for licensing animals has gone up. The new fees are as follows, \$10.00 for one year if the animal is spay/neutered, \$20.00 for two years, and \$30.00 for three years, the third year must follow the Rabies Compendium. If the animal is not spay/neutered the cost is \$25.00 for one year, \$50.00 for two years and \$30.00 for three years. Licensing can be done at the Mapleton Police Department at 125 West Community Center Way, (400 North).

In addition, the Shelter has raised the fees considerably for the boarding of animals. Please be diligent in making sure your animals are contained, and that they are properly leashed when walking them. We will only hold animals for a very short time before taking them to the shelter. If your animal gets loose, please notify the Police Department so we can return them to you if we locate them in our city.

Police Department Move

The Mapleton City Police Department has moved to its new location in the new City Office Building located at 125 West Community Center Way (400 North). We are located in the basement. Our phone numbers will still be the same, 911 for immediate emergencies, 489-9668 for an officer, and 491-8048 for all other matters. We look forward to serving you in your law enforcement needs.




The Louise Jensen Thompson Vernon Ray Bird Home

1183 South Main Street Mapleton, Utah

This house was build for the Vernon Ray Bird family about the year of 1900. It was constructed of red brick and consisted of a kitchen, parlor, and two bedrooms. The kitchen was located on the front of the house facing west, and off the kitchen was an enclosed porch with steps to the cellar. On this porch the butter was churned and the washing was done. The Kitchen was warm and friendly. It had a good coal range which was equipped with a reservoir, and while it bakes many loaves of fragrant bread for the family, it also heated water for washing clothes and the traditional bath in a tine tub. The well was conveniently located out front by the kitchen door. There was a nice barn and sheds on the farm. Mr. Bird liked horses and kept many for work and pleasure. All of the children helped on the farm, and after work and school they enjoyed riding the horses. When winter came the horses would pull the sleigh, much to the delight of the children. The Bird family was large and it is interesting to note that all then of them were born in this house. Elaine relates the story of the wonderful day when her Papa purchased the organ from the old LDS Relief Society Building and brought it home to his house. Several children rode on the wagon for this exciting event. As they road along home in the evening of warming themselves around the coal heater in the parlor and enjoying the popcorn or homemade ice cream, the children convened near the organ and marched around the room to the rhythm of the "Going To Bed March". There were many happy times spent in this house by the Bird Family.
