## Mayor's Message

### Celebration on July 23rd – Saturday

We invite all our citizens to enjoy Mapleton's Celebration on July 23<sup>rd</sup>. Plans are in place for the City's annual parade, with the usual entertainment and excellent food being served in our City Park. Please come and enjoy the day.

### Fire Danger

This year could be extremely dangerous, due to the wet spring we have had. I would encourage property owners to cut and clean weeds and grasses from areas that could threaten their property or their neighbor's. Make sure all fire hydrants are cleaned around and accessible to fire department personnel. Also, please make sure your house numbers are easily identified from the street. This helps our City's emergency crews find where you are, if you need help.

### Development/Rezone Moratorium

The City Council voted to lift the Development/Rezone Moratorium as of June 1, 2005. Only 264 sewer connections will be allocated throughout the City each year. Agreements have been reached with Spanish Fork City to up-grade their Wastewater Treatment Plan over the next two years. This will provide an additional 700 sewer connections for Mapleton City. It was also determined by the City Council that no more than 20 connections could be used for any single development in one year. This policy is designed so as to prevent one development from monopolizing a large proportion of the allotment for the whole year. All established building lots are not affected by the Moratorium.

### New Community Center

Work is proceeding as planned on the new Community Center located west of Central Bank. We do need your financial support for the Library. The Library Fund Raising Committee has done a tremendous job in raising funds so far. We have nearly \$200,000 toward our \$600,000 goal. On June 20<sup>th</sup>-24<sup>th</sup> we will have volunteers going door-to-door asking for your help. Please be generous. This Library will be the center piece of our Community Center if we all pitch in. Each one of us will benefit from our donation, specially our children and grandchildren.

### Current Litigation Progress Report – Mapleton vs. Gibby

Several citizens have asked about the court cases involving

Mapleton City and the Wendell Gibby Property. Here is a statement from our City Attorney:

“Wendell Gibby has appealed a second conviction for damaging the environment on his property on the east bench in Mapleton. Mr. Gibby's first conviction was overturned on a procedural technicality. The technicality was the trial location. In writing, Gibby originally consented to holding the first trial in Lindon, Utah. Judge Bullock, the regular Lindon City Judge, had been appointed as the judge for Gibby to ensure he received an impartial trial. After Judge Bullock convicted him, Gibby reversed his prior written consent and objected because the first trial was not held in Mapleton. The second trial was held in Mapleton and Gibby was convicted a second time. He has appealed again.”

On the separate issue of access for the public to use the Bonneville Shoreline Trail where it passes through the Gibby property, a court hearing will take place on July 19<sup>th</sup> to hear the City Council's application for immediate occupancy. If approved, this will allow emergency vehicles to access the trail (as soon as the surface has been reinstalled) as will the use for pedestrians and equestrians.

## Public Safety

### Sidewalks are for Pedestrians

This is just a reminder that sidewalks are intended only for pedestrian use (foot traffic). It is a violation of City Code to operate any motorized vehicles on the sidewalks. It is also a violation to impede or block a sidewalk.

### Trailers and Vehicles Parked on City Streets

Many do not realize that a vehicle or trailer may only remain parked on a city street for no longer than 72 consecutive hours. Some people incorrectly assume that they can park cars, trailers and other vehicles on the street once the winter overnight parking ban is lifted. We have noticed several trailers left on the streets for long periods of time. We will be strictly enforcing the Mapleton City Code regarding on street parking. Unattended vehicles and trailers will be towed if not moved within the 72 specified period. Also, it is a violation to park a large commercial vehicle within a residential area for any extended period of time. The exception is for loading and unloading only. Large commercial vehicles parked overnight on City Streets will be ticketed.

# Annual Drinking Water Quality Report for 2004

## MAPLETON CITY CORPORATION

We're pleased to present to you this year's Annual Drinking Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality of the water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water sources are classified as groundwater and include the Right Hand Fork Springs, Dunham Spring, Service Berry Spring, Seal Well, Carnesecca Well and Westwood Well. Mapleton City has a Drinking Water Source Protection Plan that is available for review. It provides more information such as potential sources of contamination and our source protection areas. It has been determined we have a low susceptibility to potential sources of contamination such as septic tanks. If you have any questions regarding source protection, contact the office to review our source protection plan. I'm pleased to report that our drinking water meets federal and state requirements. If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Scott Bird at (801) 489-5655. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held on first and third Wednesday of each month, at 7:00 p.m. in the City Offices 35 East Maple Street.

Mapleton City routinely monitors for constituents in our drinking water in accordance with the Federal and Utah State laws. The following table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1<sup>st</sup> to December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2004. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk. In the following table you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

**Non-Detects (ND)** - laboratory analysis indicates that the constituent is not present.

**Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l)** - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

**Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (ug/l)** - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

**Parts per trillion (ppt) or Nanograms per liter (nanograms/l)** - one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.

**Picocuries per liter (pCi/L)** - picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

**Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU)** - nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

**Action Level (AL)** - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

**Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)** - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

**Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)** - The "Goal"(MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

**Date**- Because of required sampling time frames i.e. yearly, 3 years, 4 years and 6 years, sampling dates may seem out of date.

In addition to the sampling outlined in the table above, we have also sampled for 21 Volatile Organic Chemicals, 28 Pesticides, 35 Unregulated Organic Chemicals and 10 Unregulated Pesticides. These additional chemicals were not detected. If you would like a list of the specific Pesticides and Organic Chemicals that we sampled for, please contact Scott Bird at 489-5655. (11) Beryllium. A water sample taken in 2004 showed elevated levels of Beryllium. This appears to be an anomaly, as elevated levels have not been detected in historical sampling. Additional sampling will be done to determine if this is a problem. Results of this sampling will be included in the 2005 Consumer Confidence Report. Some people who drink water containing beryllium well in excess of the MCL over many years could develop intestinal lesions. All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by constituents that are naturally occurring or are man made. Those constituents can be microbes, organic or inorganic chemicals, or radioactive materials. All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Again this year, the City will be diligently enforcing the weed abatement ordinance. Last year, most who were cited came into compliance voluntarily. Those who didn't had their weeds removed by a private company hired by the City, then a bill was either attached to the property taxes or assessed directly to the owner. Please help us avoid such unnecessary measures by keeping your weeds cut and sprayed this summer!

**The John and Myra  
Whitney Murray Home**  
825 East Maple Street  
Mapleton, Utah

This house was built by John Murray several years after he and Semyra Whitney were married. In the autobiography of Ruby Warren Jensen we found this note about the house "in the summer of 1908 Jessie (Warren) hauled all the material for the John Murray home and helped some on the building". The house is facing south and is constructed of brick, the color of which is sandy beige laid with red mortar. Red bricks were laid in a decorative pattern over the windows and doors. A beautiful arch of red brick was laid over the arched entry to the front porch. Around the porch is a railing of white banister. Two doors enter the house from the front porch. This was a typical feature of the early homes. The doors are very ornate. Each one contains a window with a waterfall scene etched on it. There are two rooms on the front of the house. The east room was the parlor and the west was the dining area. Directly behind the parlor to the northeast is the master bedroom and to the northwest conveniently located was the kitchen and pantry. A sturdy wooden staircase leading from the dining room gives access to the upstairs which contains three bedrooms. All of the rooms in the house have retained their high ceilings. Around the walls of this room, and about 18 inches down from the ceiling, was a beautiful gold border of metal or wood with a patterned carving on it. The border around the walls of the dining room was dark wood and much plainer in design. There was a nice screen porch on the back of the house at one time, and storage is provided by a basement underneath. At some time a bathroom was incorporated into the house. This appears to have been quite an elegant dwelling and has been well cared for and preserved by the family. There was a large barn on the farm located to the west of the home. The barnyard was enclosed with a good fence. Golda lived in the house and it continued to receive good care. This old house remains much as it originally was, and gives us a very pleasant reminder of Mapleton's past.
