## Mayor's Message

July is the month when we all celebrate our independence and liberty, and the beginnings of our state. Many of us use, and encourage our children to use fireworks in celebration of the 4<sup>th</sup> of July and the 24<sup>th</sup> July activities. Remember that some fireworks are illegal and should not be used. Any firework that explodes, or leaves the ground is generally an illegal firework. Rockets and firecrackers are responsible for unexpected fires every year, and are even more dangerous than usual in dry years.

Last year Dr. Trapnell provided a wonderful firework display for Mapleton citizens. At his expense he hired a professional fireworks show at the Ira Allen Park. At dusk the park was filled with blankets, folding chairs and people. As we milled around we had an opportunity to visit with our neighbors, and to meet new neighbors. When darkness came the anticipation grew, then the show began. Sitting so close, we were able to watch the fireworks directly overhead as they punctuated the sky. For 15 or 20 minutes we watched as the show developed then culminated with hundreds of explosions and starbursts. It was an event to be remembered.

This year Dr. Trapnell invited Mapleton City to make the fireworks a Mapleton 24<sup>th</sup> of July tradition. He offered to join with the city to provide another bigger celebration. The city is working to provide additional entertainment for the evening, just before the fireworks start. The program and fireworks display will be free to the public. After a breakfast in the park, watching the parade, enjoying the activities and programs throughout the day, I hope many of you can join my family and me at Ira Allen Park for another wonderful end to a day of remembrance and celebration.

### Town Meeting Report

In June, I held a town meeting to discuss topics that concern each of us. The dispute over the dairy east of town has been resolved amicably and appropriately. The dispute regarding the operation of a snake breeding farm will be heard by the city council at their July 17<sup>th</sup> meeting. This is a hearing on an appeal to the City Council from the Planning Commission's decision to Mr. Sutherland a conditional use permit. A report was given on the status of two large developments that wish to annex into Mapleton City on the south side between our existing boundary and the Ensign-Bickford property. The city continues to address the Gibby development on the east side, with the possibility of a final resolution that will allow him to build 47 homes on 118 acres, and will allow the city a trail, and utility easement across his property. His development proposals are being processed by the city at this time.

I explained the progress of our secondary (pressurized) irrigation system which should be available city wide in the next year of two because of the acquisition of the Mapleton Irrigation Reservoir. Plans are being drawn up for a reservoir that will be about 8 to 10 acres in size, which will provide enough irrigation water to supply our pressurized irrigation needs citywide.

I appreciate having the opportunity to meet with many of you, hear and understand your concerns, answer your questions and keep you informed on important issues in our city.

## UDOT Public Meeting

The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) will hold a meeting to discuss improvements to the Interstate 15 interchange at State Route 77 (400 South -Exit 260) in Springville, Utah. The meeting will be held Wednesday, July 25 from 5 to 7 p.m. at the Springville City Senior Center located at 65 East 200 South in Springville. At this meeting, project team members will be available to meet with the public, share information about the proposed improvements and receive comments. Major project elements include replacing the existing interchange with a Single Point Urban Interchange (SPUI), which is similar to the University Parkway Interchange, constructing a new bridge over the Union Pacific Railroad at about 1500 West and widening SR-77 from I-15 to US 89 (Main Street) in Springville. Additionally, an auxiliary lane will be added to I-15 southbound between the SR-75 and SR-77 interchanges. These proposed improvements will provide a safer roadway into the Springville-Mapleton area by reducing congestion and travel delays along the SR-77 corridor. An environmental document is being prepared to disclose any environmental consequences that may result from the project. UDOT is hosting an Open House to share project information and to receive comments from the community. ## 24 of July Grand Marshall



Dorothy Roundy has been selected as the Grand Marshall of the Mapleton 24th of July Parade. She is an example of pioneer spirit and has established a heritage of hard work and service. She feels her late husband Max should share this recognition, and is humbled by this honor. Dorothy Roundy was born in Lewisville, Idaho on Feb. 23, 1927 and spent her childhood on the family farm. The 7th of nine children of Preston and Edna Ellsworth, she learned to work hard, hoeing sugar beets, harvesting grain, driving tractor, irrigating, herding cattle, and picking potatoes. "I wouldn't trade my experience of being raised on a farm for anything. It was great training." Dorothy graduated from Midway High School in 1941, and attended Utah State College in Logan. She graduated in May 1945 with a BS Degree in Food and Nutrition, and completed an Internship in Dietetics at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. She was hired as Dietician at Utah Valley Hospital in Provo and met Max Roundy when he visited his mother in the hospital. Max and Dorothy were married on October 30, 1948 in Lewisville and were later sealed in the Provo Temple. They were the proud parents of 4 children, James, Evan, Frank, and Cheryl. They lived in Springville, purchased the property from Max's mother in 1960, and built their current home in 1968. Dorothy, in addition to her hospital career, worked right alongside Max. She disked, drove tractors, picked and sorted cherries, peaches and apples and enjoyed annual "fruit runs" to Arizona and Idaho to deliver fresh fruit and receive citrus or potatoes in exchange. She has always maintained a large garden and berry patch and prepares delicious meals and desserts from her harvests, as many will attest. An original member of the Maple Mountain DUP Camp, she served as Captain for 4 years and as Vice President of the Mapleton Company for 2 years. She is proud of her pioneer heritage as a descendant of Brigham Young, Edmund Ellsworth, and John Taylor. She is dedicated to her family, and her hospitality and support have been extended both to them and countless friends. She has 16 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren who love to listen to her stories and enjoy her legendary food. Dorothy is a member of the Utah Dietetic Association, and a dedicated volunteer for the Human Rights Committee for Group Homes for the Handicapped and the Family Council at the Utah State Development Center. "We felt Mapleton would be a great place to raise our family and it has been. People were friendly and our boys had good friends. Dorothy remembers when Dave Carson moved in across the lane and asked Max one morning how much he would take for the place. They agreed just the canyon breeze at night was worth a million dollars! "Life has been very good to me. I have the support of my family. The greatest joy I have is being with my family, and we enjoy our times together. I have enjoyed living in Mapleton. It's the most beautiful place there is!"

## Transportation Advisory Commission

The Mapleton City Council approved an ordinance creating the Transportation Advisory Commission. The Commission consists of seven members appointed by the Mayor with the advice and consent of the City Council, to act in an advisory capacity to the Planning Commission, City Council and city staff. The term of service is four years, but the first members will draw lots to determine staggering terms—four members will serve four years and three members will serve three years.

## New Mapleton Library

A new and exciting opportunity is coming to Mapleton. With the tremendous growth of our community, we need an independently certified public library. Presently a Bookmobile provides limited but temporary services. To meet the state guidelines for a certified public library, there are three main areas that must be met: 1. the housing of the library, 2. the staffing of the library, and 3. the book collection. Item one, the library facility is already complete and is located in the City Center. For item two, the City Council has committed to establish a line item budget for staffing and maintenance of the library. Item three, the establishment of the book collection, is the present challenge. The current collection belongs to the Bookmobile and will go with the Bookmobile when that service ends. In order to become an independent certified public library, it is necessary to have a quality core collection of books. Our goal is to have a collection of 20,000 titles within three years. The initial meeting of the Mapleton library steering committee was held on April 18<sup>th</sup>. Interested citizens are welcome to attend these meetings that are held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of the month at 7:00pm. Members of the committee are Keith Stirling, Lonnie Oman, Richard Nixon, James Baird, Cheryl Unice and Cheryl Taylor. Stay tuned for the future plans to make this dream a reality.

## Fire Department

Due to the dry weather conditions and the high risk of fire danger, the Mapleton Fire Department is requesting that there be no fireworks east of 1200 East and south of 2000 South, and that extreme caution be used when lighting off fireworks within the city.
